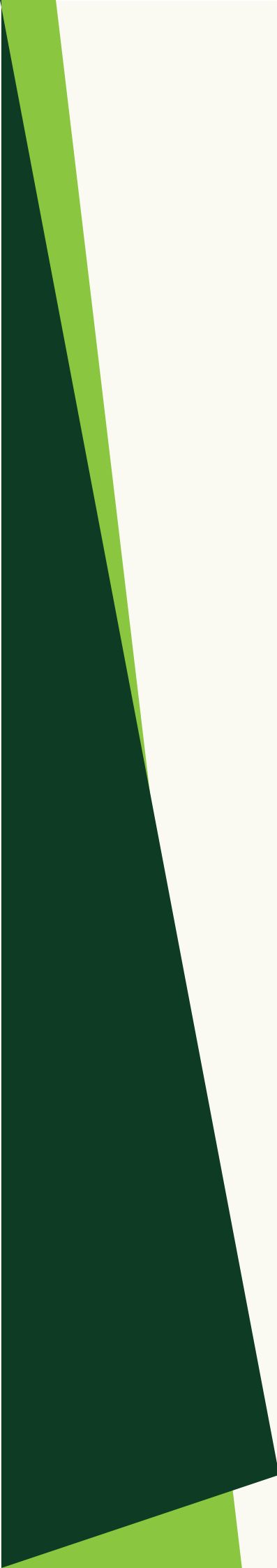

GLOBAL WEEK OF ACTION 2026

The Global Week of Action 2026 was an initiative of The Climate Reality Project, held from 1-7 June 2026 to mark 20 years of climate action and leadership across its global network. The initiative focused on increasing support for clean energy solutions and encouraging action that can help build healthier, more resilient communities.

As part of this global effort, The Climate Reality Project India & South Asia Branch mobilised Climate Reality Leaders, Green Campus Programme schools, higher education institutions, educators, students, and community stakeholders across India under the shared message:

Clean Energy, Clean Communities, Cooler Planet

Throughout the week, participants carried climate conversations into spaces where decisions are made and where change is experienced from village councils and government offices to marketplaces and neighbourhoods. Their efforts demonstrated that meaningful climate action is not defined by scale alone but by how local actions, conversations, and partnerships can contribute to broader environmental progress.

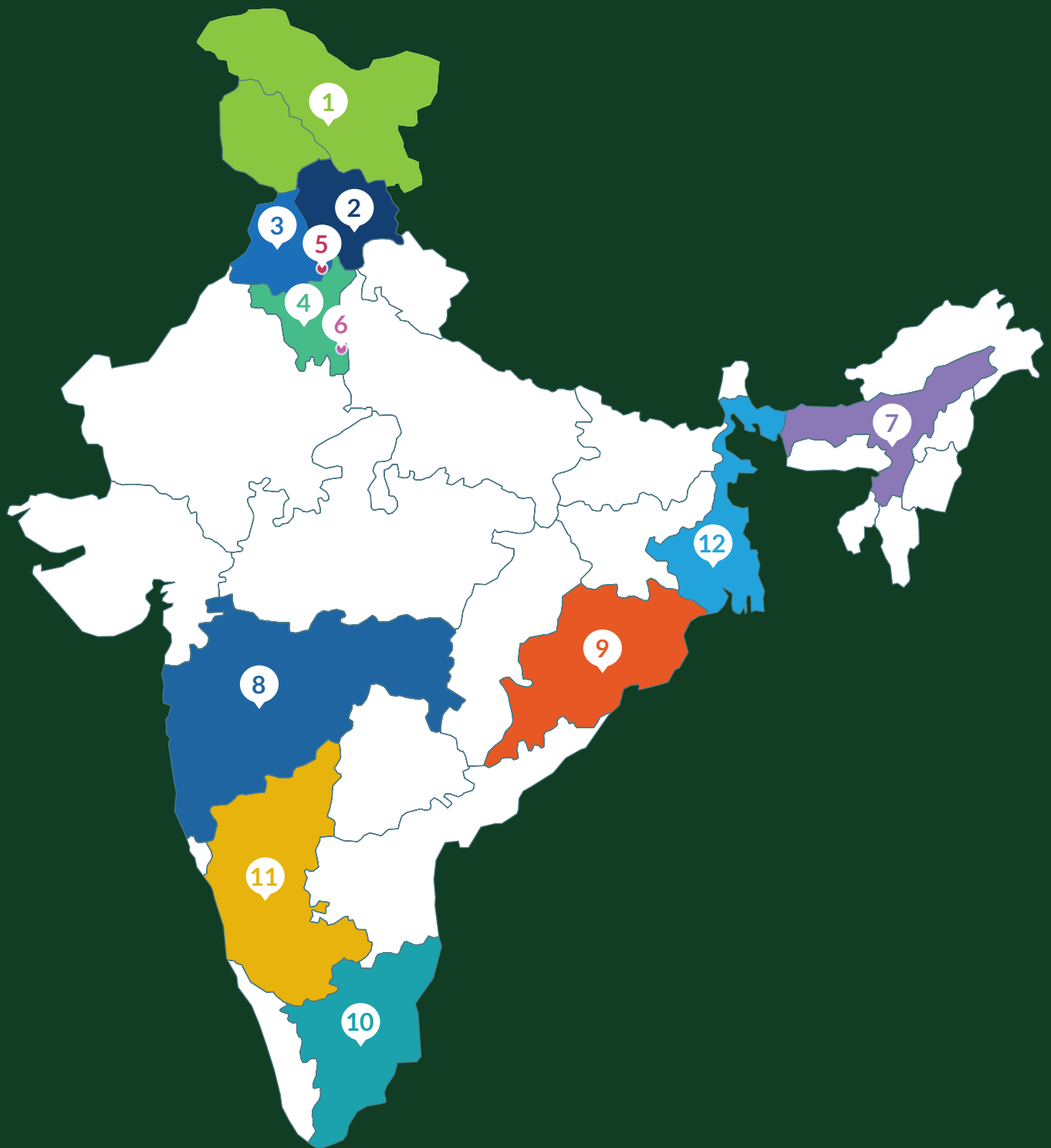

IMPACT STORIES

From a Solar Demonstration to a Village-Wide Solar Vision

Sanjeevani Vidyalaya, Bhadkambe-Nagav, Sangli | Maharashtra

Teachers and students of Sanjeevani Vidyalaya visited the Gram Panchayat Office, Bhadkambe-Nagav, with a working solar energy model, demonstrating how rooftop solar systems can reduce electricity costs while supporting environmental sustainability. Alongside the demonstration, students submitted a memorandum to the Sarpanch encouraging greater awareness and adoption of clean energy solutions within the community and supporting the effective implementation of the PM Surya Ghar Yojana.

The interaction sparked a broader discussion on the future of clean energy in the village. During the discussion, the Sarpanch shared that 18 households had already installed solar panels and expressed a commitment to expand adoption across all households.

Key Outcome

Village leadership articulated a vision to work towards making **Bhadkambe-Nagav a community with 100% solar-powered homes**, elevating the conversation from awareness to long-term clean energy adoption.



From Data Collection to Local Action

Dharmveer Sambhaji Vidyalaya, Gaundare, Solapur | Maharashtra

Recognising that effective clean energy adoption begins with informed action, Mr. Kale, a teacher at Dharmveer Sambhaji Vidyalaya, secured official data from the local electricity board identifying 118 households eligible under the PM Surya Ghar Yojana.

Armed with this information, a delegation of teachers and students visited the Gram Panchayat Office, where they presented the eligibility list and a memorandum to the Sarpanch and Village Development Officer (VDO), encouraging wider adoption of rooftop solar systems within the community. The data revealed that the Gram Panchayat building itself was among the eligible structures, creating an opportunity for local leadership to demonstrate its commitment to clean energy.

Key Outcome

The Sarpanch and Village Development Officer committed to pursuing **solar installation on the Gram Panchayat building** and **actively engaging the 118 eligible households**, translating school-led action into a practical pathway for community-wide solar adoption.



Clean Energy Outreach with Local Traders in Bandipora

N.M. Boys Higher Secondary School, Bandipora | Jammu & Kashmir

Exposure to a solar awareness session encouraged students to translate learning into action through public outreach and environmental stewardship. Building on this learning, they carried out a public rally where working solar models were used to demonstrate the functioning and benefits of solar energy to the wider community.

The engagement then expanded into environmental action, as students led a cleanliness drive on campus and along the Madhumati Riverbank. Plantation activities were also undertaken on campus, reflecting a broader understanding of environmental responsibility linked with ecological conservation.

As part of their civic engagement, students submitted a clean energy representation to the Joint Director of School Education, North Kashmir, Hakeem Tanvir Ahmad, highlighting the need to strengthen renewable energy adoption in schools across the district.

Key Outcome

The Joint Director of School Education, North Kashmir indicated support for promoting **solar energy adoption across schools in District Bandipora**.



From Learning to Community Action

GHSS Rainawari, Srinagar | Jammu & Kashmir

The solar awareness session sparked student-led action that moved into community outreach.

Students reflected their learning through poster-making, using visual expression to communicate the importance of solar energy in their own context. These posters were carried into a public rally and further extended into door-to-door engagement, where students shared pamphlets with shopkeepers and local residents, initiating direct conversations on solar energy awareness and use.

As the engagement expanded, students submitted representation letters to Hon'ble MLA Khanyar, Haji Ali Mohammad Sagar Sahib, and engaged with Mr. Anwar Khanji, SHO Rainawari, highlighting the need for stronger local support for renewable energy adoption and solar-powered public infrastructure.

Key Outcome

Local representatives committed to the **installation of solar street lights** following student-led engagement on renewable energy solutions.



Delivering the Clean Energy Message to the Assam Legislative Assembly

As part of the Global Week of Action 2026, Climate Reality Leader and National Coordinator – Biodiversity, Mr. Rituraj Phukan, Founder, Indigenous People’s Climate Justice Forum, and Climate Reality Leader Mr. Anjan Sarma, Founder Editor, Mahabahu, formally delivered a Clean Energy Petition to the Hon’ble Speaker of the Assam Legislative Assembly, Mr. Ranjeet Kumar Dass, and Mr. Rajib Bhattacharyya, Secretary, Assam Legislative Assembly, at Dispur, Guwahati.

The petition emphasised the importance of strengthening clean energy initiatives, promoting affordable clean energy solutions, and encouraging greater community participation in climate action. The engagement provided an opportunity to place clean energy priorities before senior legislative leadership while highlighting the role of public awareness and community engagement in advancing a cleaner and more sustainable future.

Key Outcome

Officials recognised the importance of promoting awareness of affordable clean energy solutions, ensuring that clean energy priorities reached key decision-makers within the Assam Legislative Assembly.



Bringing Clean Energy Priorities Before State Leadership

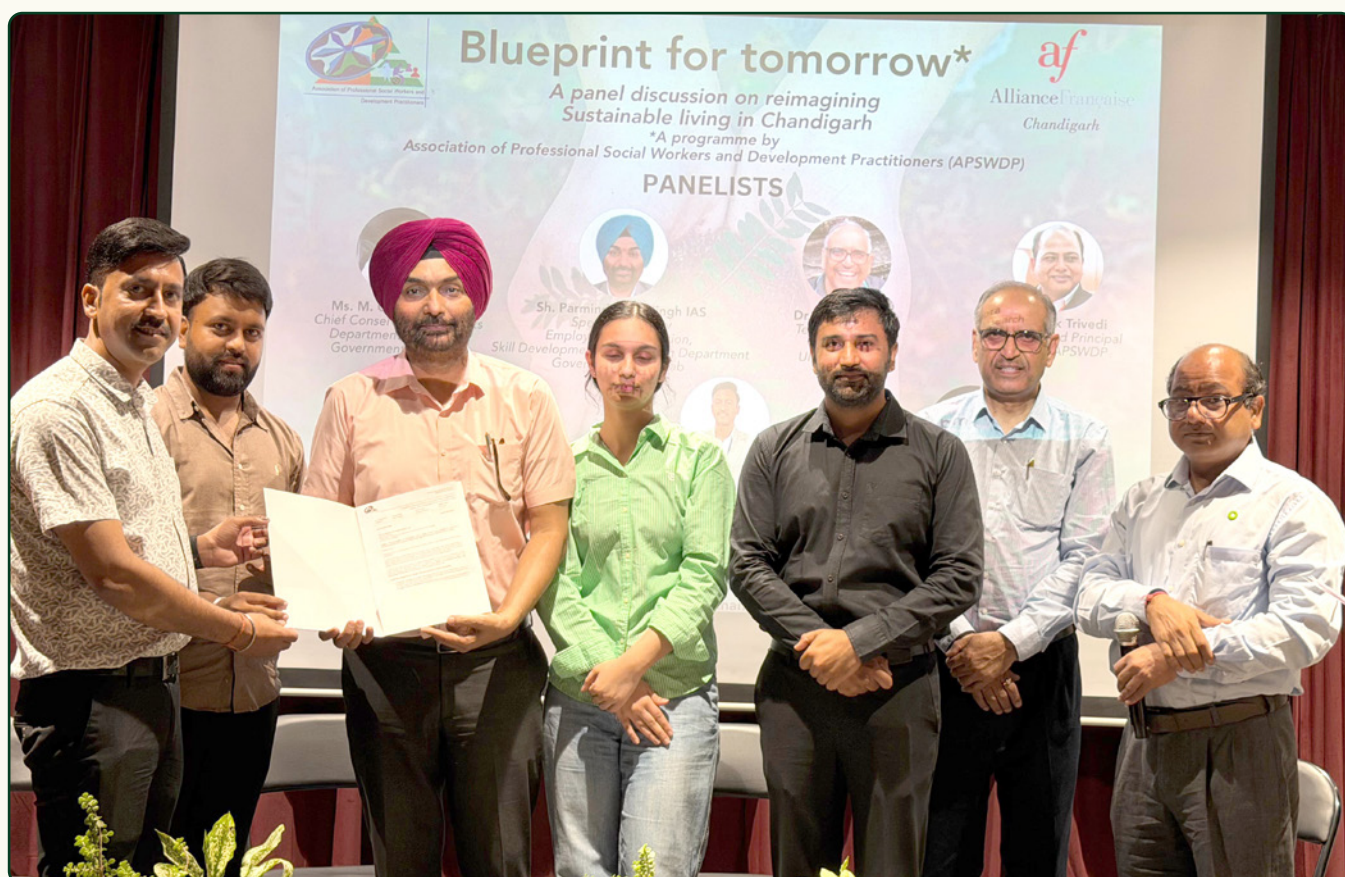

Under the leadership and mentorship of Climate Reality Leader Dr. Vivek Trivedi, National Coordinator - Climate Disaster & Livelihood, Climate Reality Leaders Dr. Sumit Arora, Karamveer Singh, Dr. Pooja Chopra, Rajeev Kumar, Gurpreet Choudhary, Akash Yadav, Deepak Yadav, and Shrishti Raizayada presented a signed Clean Energy Petition to the Special Secretary, Employment Generation, Skill Development and Training, Government of Punjab, and Ms. Geethanjali, IFS, Chief Conservator of Forests, Punjab.

The petition highlighted the importance of clean energy, biodiversity conservation, environmental stewardship, and youth participation in climate action. It was presented during the panel discussion “Blueprint for Tomorrow: From Personal Lifestyle Changes to Sustainable Communities,” organised by APSWDP in collaboration with Alliance Française de Chandigarh, which brought together government officials, environmental experts, youth leaders, and civil society representatives.

Key Outcome

The engagement strengthened dialogue on clean energy and sustainable development, providing an opportunity for youth-led climate priorities to reach key decision-makers in Punjab.

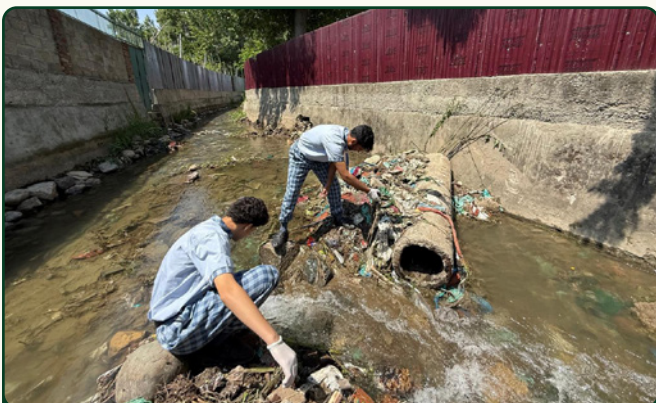
