EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Youth for COP 2025 is a global youth leadership initiative designed to strengthen climate literacy, systems understanding, and communication skills among young people from the Global South, ahead of COP30. What began as a regional capacity-building effort in the previous edition has evolved into a global platform that brings together youth living on the frontlines of the climate crisis, equipping them with the knowledge, tools, and confidence to meaningfully engage with international climate processes. The programme places a strong emphasis on climate justice, regional equity, and amplifying voices that are often underrepresented in global climate conversations.

The 2025 edition of Youth for COP engaged over 1,500 participants from more than 48 countries, supported by 23 partner organisations and 27 expert speakers from across regions. Delivered over a three-month period, the programme included six expert-led thematic sessions and two practical workshops, covering key areas such as COP processes, climate finance, adaptation, biodiversity, nationally determined contributions (NDCs), and just transition. Each session blended technical inputs with moderated discussions and reflective written submissions, ensuring active participation and deeper learning. The programme recorded consistently high engagement, with an average of 200 submissions per session and an overall 91% quality score, reflecting strong comprehension and critical thinking among participants.

A defining feature of Youth for COP 2025 was its regional diversity and lived-experience-driven learning. Participants shared first-hand accounts of climate impacts through written blogs addressing issues such as heatwaves, flooding, water scarcity, biodiversity loss, food insecurity, and displacement across Latin America, Africa, South Asia, Southeast Asia, and Small Island contexts. These experiences helped to shed light on local realities, supporting peer learning and cross-regional solidarity. The programme culminated in the production of 76 youth-authored blogs and 312 social media imprints, collectively amplifying youth priorities, justice-based demands, and grassroots climate realities to wider audiences.

Overall, Youth for COP 2025 contributed to building a more informed, confident, and connected cohort of young climate leaders. By strengthening understanding of climate policy processes and encouraging informed dialogue, the programme supported youth to engage constructively in climate conversations leading up to COP30 and beyond, reinforcing the role of young people as informed stakeholders in shaping equitable and inclusive climate action.

The Youth for COP 2025 program has been a remarkable platform to nurture informed, confident, and engaged young leaders from across the Global South. It serves as a testament to the transformative power of youth engagement and the potential of collective action in advancing climate solutions.

PROGRAM OVERVIEW

Sessions:

Youth for COP 2025 launched on 25 July with a powerful opening session, setting the stage for six expert-led sessions held from late July to mid-October. Together, they created a rigorous learning journey that blended structured knowledge with meaningful creative expression.

Each session delivered essential climate insights, backed by pre-session guidebooks and assignments that deepened participant understanding. Three expert inputs in every session were followed by a dynamic moderated panel, ensuring students could engage directly with specialists shaping global climate action.

Assignments transformed learning into reflection, communication, and advocacy. With an average of 200 submissions per session and a remarkable 91% quality score, participants demonstrated both commitment and a strong grasp of the climate negotiation process.



Workshops:

Two hands-on workshops enabled participants to put their learning into practice and strengthen their advocacy voice:

- The first workshop focused on practical climate advocacy, helping participants translate insights from the training sessions into real-world action.
- The second workshop unlocked the power of creative communication, guiding participants through arts-based climate storytelling and the crafting of impactful personal narratives.



Debriefing session:

The COP Debriefing Session served as the concluding engagement, translating global negotiations into meaningful takeaways:

- The session reflected on key outcomes of COP30 through perspectives from South Asia, Southeast Asia, Latin America, and Small Island Developing States (SIDS), highlighting shared priorities around climate justice, adaptation, and finance.
- It reinforced the growing role of youth in climate diplomacy, emphasizing collective learning, regional solidarity, and pathways for sustained youth-led action beyond COP.


